

















Introduction




International Flavour at RSS Submitted by Andy Pfeiffer

Revelstoke students welcomed thirteen international students into our school this year. Revelstoke Secondary continues to benefit from the rich diversity that comes with having international students attend school here. Most of our exchange students were from western Europe, primarily Germany: we had nine Germans and two Swiss students. In addition we successfully hosted our first grade 8 exchange student, Alejandro, who was from Mexico, and as a result of Ale's success, we look forward to hosting a couple more young Mexican students next year. Brazilian Rotary Exchange student Lucas Parreiras rounded out the international flavour at RSS this year. International students are encouraged to get involved and participate in extra-curricular activities and activities in the broader community of Revelstoke.

We look forward to our continued collaboration with the Rocky Mountain International Student Program from School District #6.







Ono Cho Visit 2014

We had a visit from our Ono Cho Exchange group from Japan from February 12-17, 2014. The group consisted of 4 adults and 16 students. 
A MADD assembly was held at RSS on October 21st. The multi-media presentation was very poignant and effective in spreading the message of drinking and driving.


The Remembrance Day Ceremonies on November 8th were very well done this year. Students were very respectful, and Mr. Stevens' speech was very powerful.





Mathematics Department Report Submitted by Jarrett Spannier

With returning veterans Carey, Colvin, Howard and Spannier the RSS Math
Department was once again the pinnacle of success in 2013/14. Add to that
a super math sub in Mr. Kai Boggild and you have the recipe for success for years to come. The group will continue into the 2014/15 school year. Some highlights of the year are outlined below:

Grade 8: Jeff Colvin instructed 2 of 3 of the math 8 blocks this year. He uses a textbook and smart board approach for his classroom instruction whereas Lida continued her booklet/worksheet approach. Although they use different approaches in their instruction the common goal is to bring students to a level where they will be successful in Math 9.

Grade 9: Lida Carey handled all the Math 9 students again this year — being assigned all 3 blocks. Her revamped worksheets from her work the previous year allowed classes to run smoothly and efficiently. This year, two grade 8 students were placed in Math 9 after completing their grade 8 math course during grade 7. These two students scored top marks in the Math 9 class out-performing those a year older than them and are thus well prepared for Math 10 next year.

Grade 10: Once again our grade 10 students were well prepared for the provincial exam. Jarrett Spannier taught the first 2 of the 3 classes of Grade 10 math this year. These 44 students scored 3% higher than the provincial average. 36 of the 37 students who took a passing grade into the exam – achieved a passing mark on the exam. Further to this, our students had a higher percentage of A's, B's and C+ on the exam than students from around the province. Our school mark percentage is slightly lower than the provincial average as we continue to keep our standards high – our students are outperforming many students from around the province. RSS continues to use the electronic/online format for the Foundations 10 exam – as we know that the entire province will be shifting in this direction very soon. We will be well prepared for the shift when it occurs.

In regards to Apprenticeship Workplace Math 10 all 14 students enrolled in the course meet the learning outcomes. In fact, these 14 students scored almost 12% higher than the provincial exam average. This is the result of appropriate placing of students in a course where they can be successful. A special thanks goes to the Mr. Kai Boggild in his dedication as a Teacher On Call down the final stretch in this course.

Grade 11: Revelstoke Secondary School continues to offer 3 math courses at the Grade 11 level (2-Pre-calculus 11, 1-Foundations 11 and 1-Apprenticeship Workplace Math 11). Students are gaining success in their math study due to the ability to choose a course that is best suited for their ability. We also have some students doing 2 Math 11 courses so that they can meet the requirements at different post-secondary schools.

Grade 12: This is the grade that saw the most change this year. Lida Carey is in the process of implementing a Foundations of Math 12 course. With a major unit on finance she has arranged community experts to come in and give talks on investment, taxes and loans. This community involvement will surely bring a 'real-life' sense to this course.

Jeff Colvin has been given the challenge to oversee the work of 4 students doing Apprenticeship Workplace Math 12 by correspondence in his Apprenticeship Workplace Math 11 classroom. The fact that these students have chosen to take a grade 12 Math elective speaks volumes towards the effort and dedication of the teachers in Apprenticeship Workplace Math 10 and 11. These students have developed an appreciation for math, especially finance, and are gaining some important life skills in the process.

Jarrett Spannier continued his development of the Pre-calculus 12 and Calculus 12 courses offered at RSS. 45 students were enrolled in Pre-calculus 12 this year – of which 12 are grade 11's. 40% of these students scored at the A level in this course, with another 35% at the B level. Outstanding success for our students at this level is earning our grads early acceptance to their post-secondary school of choice.


In addition to Pre-calculus 12, our school has been able to deliver a **Calculus 12** program to 17 of our future science, engineering and business post-secondary students. This course continues to challenge our top students as Spannier pushes them in an attempt to prepare them for the rigor that lies ahead. We certainly hope support continues for this valuable course regardless of lower enrolment numbers due a shrinking school paradiam on.



The Math Department must highlight the following as we are extremely proud of these numbers. Of our 82 grade 12 students – 55 of them have chosen to take a grade 12 math course as an elective (33 in precalc 12, 18 in Foundations 12 and 4 in AW-12) I think you would be hard pressed to find another school where 67% of their graduating population is enrolled in a Math 12 elective.

Highlights from outside the classroom:

Members of the department remain involved in provincial committees gaining insight in future curriculum changes. One of the members is in the process of earning a Masters degree in curriculum development. One is learning the in's and out's of being a father, the other spoiling her granddaughter on a regular basis ©.





English Department Board Report

New Staff and Successful Practices.


There were a few more staffing changes in the English Department this year, and so we banded together to develop our students' language skills and foster their appreciation of reading, writing, thinking, and sharing.

This year, veteran members Meghan Simpson, Andy Pfeiffer, and Jeff Wilson welcomed Jenna Bauche, Shaun Moore, Tessa Davis, and Kristin Demchuk to the department. Together, we worked to ensure that all English teachers had the support and resources that they needed for their classrooms through mentoring and resource sharing. We also worked together to maintain a consistent approach to course content and our marking policies. Using an online conference tool, teachers connected to a library of resources including book lists and marking rubrics that we have developed for each grade level.

Technology in the Classroom:

Our English teachers maintained classroom blogs to communicate our daily activities and expectations to students and their parents. Using these blogs, teachers also posted additional resources for students to extend their learning including video links used during instruction.


Smart boards are in use in each classroom on a daily basis to provide information and highlight key ideas. There are also students in our classrooms using digital files and dictation software to demonstrate their learning with greater independence. We have also developed a digital library of certain materials so students who may struggle with reading can use audiobooks, Kurzweil files, or videos to support their learning.



Taking it to the Streets!

The English Department also likes to take students out of the classroom to enhance their experiences and their learning. Last spring, we took a group of students to see *Hamlet* at Vancouver's Bard on the Beach festival in Vancouver, and we are hoping to attend *A Midsummer Night's Dream* this spring. Students at RSS are also benefitting from our Performing Arts Centre (RPAC). English classes have attended a variety of thought provoking presentations there including Meghan Gardiner's *Dissolve*, a one-woman play about the dangers of 'drink spiking and drug-induced sexual assault'. A senior English class and one RSS Drama class will also attending a special presentation of Revelstoke Theatre's presentation of a *The Dumb Waiter*. Collaboration with the directors and actors of the Revelstoke Theatre Company allows us to tailor our class material to some of the exciting things happening in the arts in our community. In April, we are also hoping to bring Greg Frankson, a spoken word poet, into our Grade 11 and 12 classrooms for a writing workshop.

With a new team of teachers in the English department, we will work to maintain the instructional practices that help our students achieve academic success, and we will strive to keep our classrooms vibrant and enjoyable places to learn.



Social Studies Department

In an era of decreasing enrolment, we were pleased to be able to offer most of our electives, including History 12, Law 12 and First Nations 12. Sadly, we could not offer Geography 12 this year due to numbers. We are appreciative of our School Board that continues to encourage diversity in course offerings, as well as helping to create as many classes as possible.


Our courses continue to be supplemented by our connections with local groups/organization such as Parks Canada. The grade 8 students were able to participate in geocaching activities on Mount Revelstoke! Sadly, I did not take pictures, but I can assure you that a good time was had by all! Field trips such as this really make the curriculum come alive when students can appreciate a practical and local connection to what they are learning about in the classroom. To this end, Mr. Stevens' ever -popular trip to the courthouse in Kelowna was successful, as was his end of year Courtroom Drama at our local Courthouse! I continue to work closely with the Revelstoke Museum and Archives to bring home the local impact of WW1 and 2 in Revelstoke for the grade 11's. Later this semester, the grade 10's will enjoy quite a bit of local history as they tour the historic downtown as well as the Revelstoke Cemetery this spring. We will also be working with the Revelstoke Railway Museum. The First Nations 12 class will once again visit the Okanagan Reserve in Vernon, as well as local river spots. Sadly, these field trips will occur later this semester, so there are no pictures to share with you until next year.


A huge highlight for our department this year is the field trip to Europe, which will take place March 18th to the 27th. The Canadian Battlefields Tour will highlight Canadian participation in the Cold War, as well as World War 1 and 2. Sixteen students from grades 10-12 will join me, and another group from a high school in Campbell River, in tracing the steps of Canadians during some of the most significant moments of the twentieth century. Again, I'm afraid you will have to wait for those pictures ©.

Mr. Stevens has applied to participate in a very exciting workshop that would take him to China and Korea. We wish him luck in earning a spot for such an important learning opportunity! Experiences such as this, as well as the European field trip, keep our teachers, and therefore our students, up to date with current research and happenings! I continued to participate on the Provincial Exam Marking Committee for Social Studies 11. We meet in Vancouver in the summer to review the Provincial Exams. This is important as it affords me the opportunity to meet with colleagues from around the province and to ensure that RSS measures up to provincial standards. Last year's exam results were well above the provincial average. Being a part of this group helps to keep our school current with best practice, as well as trends in teaching social studies.

Our Department has embraced some of the new 21st Century Learning Goals. In History 12, for example, the traditional multiple choice/essay final exam was replaced with a summative evaluation format much more reflective of 'differentiated learning'. Each student was required to demonstrate their knowledge of a major theme that runs through the course by whatever means made the most sense to their learning style. As a result, students composed original music, created exceptional poetry and canvasses, and made their own films! Mr. Hooker was invited to attend and I can honestly say that I had goose bumps watching some of the performances, and sitting with each student as they taught me what they had learned from the course! It was a risk worth taking as I sincerely believe that those students learned a lot more from this experience than they would have from a more traditional exam format. I hope that Mr. Hooker will share some of the footage with you ...

It has been a good year for our Department and we look forward to sharing more pictures with you next year! It is important that we continue to be able to offer a variety of our senior electives, and meet the demands of the twenty first century with an increasing judicious use of computer technology. Further, our partnership with local organizations and groups is not only rewarding, but necessary, in order to demonstrate to our students the importance of community connections in the enrichment of all our lives.





Art Department Report

Once again it was a great year for the RSS Art Department. We ran 2 blocks of Visual Arts 9/10, one in each semester. Two blocks of Studio Arts 11/12 (Drawing and Painting and Ceramics and Sculpture) took place, one also in each semester. This course was new for us this year and proved to be very successful, allowing students to specialize in either Drawing and Painting or Ceramics and Sculpture. We also had a class called Visual Arts Media 10, 11, 12 and it ran in conjunction with Visual Arts 9/10 first semester, Studio Arts second semester and also on its own second semester. We also ran an Art Foundations 11/12 first semester. The grade 8 Visual Arts ran in two sections, one in term 1, semester 1 and one in term 1, semester 2. In addition to all of the above classes, select students, usually ones hoping to pursue a career in Art, were allowed to do an IDS (Independent Directed Study). The instructor and the student sat down together and decided their focus of work and the required assignments they would do. The student then created a plan of study and had to submit this prior to being accepted to this course. We had nine students do IDS's this year, three first semester and six second semester.

The Art 8 classes this year did several assignments. The grade 8 class was no longer divided into a 2-D and 3-D, so students got to do a little bit of both. This included crayon batiks, pattern banners, a 3-D Personal Collage and a sunset jar.

The Visual Arts 9/10 classes did a variety of assignments that included drawing, painting, sculpture and ceramics. They also did Styrofoam prints and if time allows will do some life studies or a theme study.

The Studio Arts classes did a number of assignments, looking at historical moments or social issues and illustrating it, a spin on Pandora's box and looking at the connection between positive and negative space, but switching it around. Each of these assignments allowed the student to choose the medium they wanted to work in and had some minimum size requirements.


The Art 11/12 classes also did several different assignments. These included paintings; they had to emulate the style of a well-known artist. We had some great pieces done, and an especially good one of Van Gogh's. They also did Mandalas, which are circular presentations of one's inner journey and a look at who they are. They did plasticine sculptures, and two drawing assignments, one that was portraiture, in which they chose someone of some fame or perhaps infamy.

The Media 10, 11, 12 student did a number of assignments that they were able to choose the level of technology they could incorporate. Some did work entirely on the computer and this was very good for one student who does not have the physical ability to draw, but can do art on the computer. He was very excited about being able to do art this way. Some of the assignments we did included a self-portrait, combining the elements of an urban and rural environment, Pop art, looking at the Human Condition and a photo shoot.


This year, we again teamed up with the Visual Arts Centre and will hold an exhibition (May 09 to June 06) called "A Little Bit of Everything." This exhibit showcases the work of students from RSS in several classes, Art Foundations 11/12, Visual Arts Media 10, 11, 12, Studio Arts 11/12, a couple of exceptional students who are in 9/10 Visual Arts and some students who are doing Independent Directed Studies (grade 12's). It will encompass work from a wide range of subjects, mediums and 2 and 3 dimensional pieces. It shows what incredibly talented youth we have in our community. All students from the art classes mentioned above were asked to submit to the teacher at least one piece that they wished to exhibit. This piece could come from something they had already done as a class assignment or if they wished, they were welcome to do something specifically for this exhibit that was not part of a class mark or assignment. By the way, several students submitted 2 or 3 pieces. What differs from last year is that we will be taking over the entire gallery. Last year, the 3 smaller side galleries had other artists in them, not from the school. This year we have 9 students who submitted applications to have their own minishows in the side galleries. I was very impressed with their level of professionalism in submitting their applications, artist statements and some initial pieces.


We also had a student this year that was commissioned to do a piece for a member of the community.


All in all, I am incredibly proud of the work students have exhibited and done and I believe it is fantastic to see such a representation of art by youth in our community.
















































Modern Languages Submitted by Andy Pfeiffer and Shaun Moore

French and German language instruction continues to be offered to the students of RSS. This year French 8 through 11 were taught along with Introductory German 11. French and German instruction continues to use technology to enhance learning outcomes: the use of online programs such as *Quia* and *Duolingo* are becoming an important part of language learning at RSS. Next year, our challenges with declining enrollment continue and we hope that we can still offer a full state of French courses along with at least one German course.

French 8 students completed projects about themselves, about their friends, about food, and they will conclude with a project related to travel.

French 9 students went on a field trip to Mount Revelstoke National Park as part of their project on our national parks. They also did projects on fashion, sports, and music.






The French and German programs continue to offer rigorous and exciting courses for the benefit of our students.

The Music Department continues to thrive at Revelstoke Secondary School. There are currently 130 students enrolled in music. Students are receiving training in classical music, jazz, voice, and theory.

The standard performing groups at RSS include Concert Band 8, Concert Band 9/10, Senior Concert Band and Jazz Band. The concert bands perform three major concerts per school year. All performances take place in the Revelstoke Performing Arts Centre. There are over 500 audience members who attend each concert series. Audience members include students, parents, staff and members of the community.



Students have focused on classical composers throughout the year including Mozart, Beethoven, Tchaikovsky, and Bach. The musical elements of these composers have been explored as well as the social climate of the time in which the music was written. The classical unit led to a winter concert featuring over 8 major composers. Solo features were included on clarinet through Mozart and on mallet percussion in *Flight of the Bumblebee*.

There is currently one jazz band at the high school. Rehearsals take place in the evening and the ensemble is made up of students from grades 8-12. Multi-grade inclusion allows for mentorship and enrichment of younger students. Older students are encouraged to solo and demonstrate the ability to lead within a section. The jazz band includes a vocalist and students have learned to accompany and support singing within the ensemble. Musical styles include: swing, funk, Latin, rock and ballads.

On April 29th, 40 music students will travel to San Francisco. These young musicians will spend one week together performing and experiencing the city. Musical opportunities include:

- Elementary School Performances
- Public Performances
- University-level Clinic
- San Francisco Symphony Performance: Bach's Legacy
- Performance by virtuoso Regina Carter

Students will be performing at low-income elementary schools throughout various parts of the city. There will be volunteer opportunities as well that will allow our students to contribute to the school culture of the inner city. Musicians at RSS are taught to be mentors, leaders, and contributors. Trips such as this allow our students to shine to experience different cultural and musical experience.

This spring students in Grades 9-12 are collaborating a mass performance. A full performance of *LORD OF THE RINGS* will take place at the end of the year in the Revelstoke Performing Arts Centre. The performance will include over 60 musicians and will introduce new elements to concert presentation. Students will be spending the remainder of the school year on world music with a specific focus on the Celtic influence. Final performances will take place on June 11th and 12th, 2014.

The Music Department continues to thrive though student excellence, parental involvement, and School District support. Our musicians are very proud of their achievements and they are continually challenging and pursuing new musical goals. The Music Program is built on the characteristics of pride, dedication, passion, commitment, humility, and professionalism and it is these characteristics that hold a lasting value both during and after high school. Many of our students continue to participate in music after graduation and the skills they obtain from the music program have proved beneficial to both their personal and professional lives.





Computer Department


Introduction:

The computer department makes its home in Room 301, a 30-station Mac lab across the hall from the RSS library. This lab offers RSS students access to a modern, well-maintained computer lab, and it is appreciated by our students and envied by many visiting sports teams.

The Lab and its Uses:

Since September 2013, all teachers have been given access to the lab using an online booking procedure as well

as sign in sheets while students are in the lab. This policy has helped to make staff and students accountable for the care and appropriate use of the lab.



In addition to the three computer classes on the RSS timetable, another group that uses the lab on a regular basis is the RSS Yearbook Staff.

Courses:

Information Technology 9/10 is a course designed to introduce students to the world of digital media

(podcasts, film production, web design, and photo editing) and to help them develop skills using business applications including word processors, spreadsheets, and presentation software. We also worked on general skills such as file management, keyboarding, cloud computing, and Internet safety.

Here is a still from one of the stop-motion Lego movies that was made this year during our media unit. Lego figures were photographed hundreds of times in a series of poses (on a green screen) and then superimposed on a background for effect. Dialogue was created for the film using sound-editing software and added to the film.





Another group of students created a film about the effects of bullying, and Mr. Kenyon played one of the supporting roles in their film.

Digital Media 11 and 12 was focused on media production -photography and Photoshop in Grade 11 and then film production in Grade 12. We also added web design and some coding for students showing the aptitude and interest to extend their learning.

Whether it was for their online portfolios, a website, a nation-wide contest, or their own coffee table, students were encouraged to publish their work.

Science Department Submitted by Graham Gale






Figure 1: Participation as a percentage of all Grades 11 and 12 students.

Sarah Vincent, Kristen Scheiber, Jarrett Spannier, Rob Evans and Graham Gale taught a total of 23 sections of Science in the 2013-2014 school year. We continue to offer 10 different Science courses, including Chemistry, Biology and Physics to the Grade 12 level. RSS has a total of 174 Grade 11 and 12 students, and of these 30% were enrolled in Grade 11 or 12 Physics, 48 % were in Grade 11 or 12 Biology, 41 % were in Grade 11 or 12 Chemistry, and 16% were in Earth Science 11. Figure 1 below shows these participation rates over the previous five years. Students are required to take Science 8, 9 and 10. To graduate they must complete at least one Science 11 course.

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
RSS science students have the opportunity to learn in a variety of ways and the usual course work is supplemented with field trips and guest speakers. Sarah and Rob had Grades 8 students participate in the "Know Your Watershed" program offered through Columbia Basin Trust and facilitated by Jeanette Vickers. Sarah will take her Earth Science classes to sites around Revelstoke (including the Green Belt, Johnson Heights, and the forest behind the school) to view rock strata and features caused by glaciation. She also had Melissa Hemphill, a Holistic Nutritionist to speak to her Biology 12 students about diet and biochemistry. All three Science 10 teachers will have their classes participate in the "Farm to Table" program offered by the North Columbia Environmental Society. Jesse Johnston-Hill, a contractor of the NCES, leads 2 classroom sessions and a field trip to Terra Firma Farms to explore the connections between food production, ecology and global warming. Sarah also took her Science 10s to the Forestry Museum to learn about local forestry practices from the Brian Sumner and an employee of Stella Jones Logging. In late May, Kristen will be taking her Science 9 students to the Astronomy exhibit at the Okanagan Science Centre.

Our two equipment and storage spaces are filled with thousands if specimens, scientific (and not so scientific!) equipment, supplies and chemical reagents that allow us to deliver a program full of laboratory experiments, demonstrations and hands on activities. Our Lab Technician Debby Robinson skillfully manages our inventory, makes repairs and purchases, and prepares experiments for the five science teachers.













Drama Submitted by Carlssa Pattinson

This past fall we had a diverse group of grade 10/11 & 12's in a combined Drama class. I had 3 main goals for this class; participation, progress and demonstration of skills and knowledge. I set an environment in which all students could feel safe to participate. I had ongoing assessment/observation of their progress. I planned assignments, projects and performances in order for them to demonstrate the skills and knowledge they had acquired. We started off the 1st term with a mini unit on Improvisation. This allowed students to get to know one another and have fun participating in improve games and activities. They learned the value of improvisational skills and how they enhance an actor's performance. Next we looked at film & television, with an emphasis on television commercials. This unit on "commercials" allowed the students to explore the power of persuasion and the role of the actor in this process. Our class collaborated with an English 11 class during this unit. The English class wrote commercials for our class to perform. The English class was studying Frankenstein at the time, so they had "monster" themed commercials. It was exciting to see how the drama students interpreted the scripts and the use of costume and makeup that was incorporated. We invited the English class to our presentation of "Monster Mash."

A highlight for this semester in Drama, as well as a very large part of this course, was our production of "Ebenezer's Christmas Carol." The different abilities of each student was featured. We had a production crew, actors, an assistant director, a stage manager and producer. Due to a small class size, we also used the help of students outside of our class for roles as extras, singers and set design. After many hours of preparation the students had 3 successful performances in the Revelstoke Performing Arts Theatre. We had two day performances, and one evening performance for family and friends. In the day performances we invited the elementary schools, as well as our own student body. We were very pleased with the response of those who wanted to attend. We were thrilled, & terrified, to have all of Arrow Heights Elementary attend our first day performance. The students all worked together and the end result was that they felt success as actors in a "real" play.

At present I am teaching Drama9/Directing & Scriptwritting11/12. This is also a combined class. In this class my goals remain the same; participation, progress and demonstration of skills & knowledge. This course has its own set of challenges as I facilitate an environment where the grade 9's are learning basic dramatic skills, while at the same time are being mentored by the grade 11/12 students. In Directing and Script Writing 11/12 the students are given assignments and numerous opportunities to direct and lead the 9's. For example, each week the senior students lead class warm-up's which they prepare ahead of time with one other student. Our last class assignment was "Blast from the Past - Air Band." The grade 9's were divided into groups, each with a grade 12 director and a grade 11 assistant director. Looking forward, we hope to have an end of year production in which the grade 11/12 students will write and direct for the grade 9 students.












Metal Fabrication


With the addition of new machining equipment students are able to work beyond the basic metal fabrication processes. Precision layout techniques and tooling have enhanced and expanded the program. Grade 11 students are building bicycle trailers in conjunction with the North Columbia Environmental Society. There will be a single wheel version in the near future.






Last year we acquired a new welder that allows both the "ARC" and "TIG" processes on the same machine. With this new machine students now have the ability to acquire skills in all the welding processes utilized in industry. Machining has become the most popular component of the grade 12 program. Students now have 2 fully functioning lathes, as well as a milling machine. Every year we expand the operations we are performing on these machines. We aspire to build our first sterling engine in the 2014-15 school year.





Included are some photos of student projects designed and built in the RSS Metal shop. The grill is an excellent example of a student utilizing both the wood shop and Metal shop to complete a self-designed






Transportation Technology



The focus of this program is to repair vehicles at the senior level. The acquisition of new and up-to-date diagnostic tools brings students one step closer to realistic trade repairs. We continue to refurbish vehicles when possible and recycle them back into the community. As our equipment base broadens so too does student learning. Focus on problem solving is critical in all the shops, but is most prevalent in Automotive.






Drivetrain students are encouraged to complete major repairs to their personal vehicles and this has proven to be a great learning tool. Their focus is on utilizing technical data and repair procedures to enable in depth learning. We have completed two major rebuilds this year and are beginning our third. We currently are repairing a 1988 Chevrolet 2500 pick-up truck as our class project. Many of the Transportation Technology students are very active in outdoor motorized recreation. As a result a club is emerging where students are encouraged to maintain and repair their machines in the RSS shop. PAC has agreed to help with the purchase of a motorcycle/ATV/snowmobile lift for the shop.

Grade 10 Automotive provides students with an introduction to basic repairs and safe equipment operation. The Grade 10 program has fed the Grade 11 program in a very positive way. The students are well versed in the workings of the shop when they return for a second course. The Tech Ed shop is now utilized for a portion of this course diversifying the skills taught.

Tech Ed



Woodworking


The Residential Construction students are again building sheds for people in the community. The program also incorporates tile work as part of the curriculum. This year the class also built duck boxes for BC Hydro.




